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

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Learning Objects: Critical Mass

- We need approx. 1 Million Reusable Learning
 Objects (RLO's)
- Biggest Repositories: ca. 10,000-30,000
- PROBLEM: gap of factor 100!
- Global Learning Object Brokered Exchange
 GLOBE = MERLOT + ARIADNE + NIME +
 EdNA + eduSource Canada (Still factor 10!)

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Components of LORs

- 1. Object Store
- 2. Metadata Creation and Maintenance Database
- 3. GUI (Expose, Gather, Search, Alert, Submit,
 Store, Request, Deliver = IMS Digital
 Repository Interoperability Specification)
- 4. Internet Connection

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Types of LORs

- 1. Isolated Single Computer
- 2. Web Portal: Client-Server Architecture
- 3. Harvesting Metadata (No Object Storage = Referatory)
- 4. Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Based Systems = Federated
 Search (Edutella, LionShare, MERLOT,
 GLOBE)

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Re-Usability

- Content is King?
